

Lessons Learned

There are no silver Bullets

Identify the reform objectives. Not as easy as you think

What worked in one state may fail in another – recognizing inter-state differences.



Reform requires constant monitoring & maintenance with explicit metrics

Cover the entire system and take nothing off the table

It may take years before you feel the impact



Some of the nation's best practices and solutions started at the county

Demonstrate how state reform will benefit (impact) the county

How will law enforcement/courts work around the reforms?



Post-reform restraint (if successful): Constant pressure to return to the old days

Many county jail problems are not attributable to the State

Balancing community norms & values

Lessons Learned

Prison expansion should always be an option available to DOC Commissioners under the right master plan.
