□ Governor's Executive Order 42

On December 30, 2013, Governor Robert Bentley created the Alabama Executive Veterans Network Commission through Executive Order 42, which commits Alabama to providing the best possible services to our Nation's Servicemembers, Veterans and their Families.



□ Purpose

To leverage existing network resources and to explore opportunities to expand service capacity to Servicemembers, Veterans and their Families.

A community centric solution developed through collaboration whereby state, federal, city, county and local entities partner and exponentially impact support to Servicemembers, Veterans and their Families.

Maximize the collective impact of community resources (civilian and government) to Servicemembers, Veterans and Families in order to build resilience and foster a Community Network that is both sustainable and relevant.


Veteran Snapshot – Alabama

- □ Deployed 20,471 (3,546 Active Duty; 11,337 National Guard; 5,688 Reserve)
- Dependents 85,186 (35,684 Active Duty; 49,502 Reserve/National Guard)
- □ 33% (one-third) reported divorce, dangerous driving, increased substance use, and increased anger control problems since deployment.
- □ Spouse Abuse 6,767 (2008); 7,476 (2009); 8,411 (2010)
- □ Child Abuse Incidents per 1000 children. 4.8 (2008); 4.8 (2009); 5.7 (2010).



An Estimated 20,500 OIF/OEF Veterans are reintegrating back into Alabama communities.


Estimated # of Iraq/Afghanistan Veterans Deployed by County Since September 2001





PTSD Estimate (2001-2013) 16.5% of Total Veterans Per County (3,373 Veterans)


Estimated # of Iraq/Afghanistan Veterans Deployed by County with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder*

□ Based on an ADVA Feasibility Study, Alabama has an estimated 750 Homeless Veterans.



Incarcerated Veterans

- □ According to the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), 8% to 10% of America's prison population are Veterans.
- Alabama's total state prison population is 31,115.

 Based on BJA's estimate, some 2,489 to 3,100 Veterans are incarcerated in Alabama state prisons. (Does not account for veterans incarcerated in county/city jails, or federal prisons in Alabama.



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Goals and Objectives

- □ Provide Pro Bono Legal Assistance to Veterans and their Families
- Reduce Veterans Unemployment to below 5%
- **■** Establish a Coordinated Access System of Homeless Veteran Services
- □ Partner with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Mental Health Summits in 2014 and Beyond
- **☐** Host the "Gateway of Hope" Conference September 2014
- **☐** Host Employer and Small Veteran Business Outreach Summit in 2015
- Develop an 24/7 Service Resource for Servicemembers, Veterans and their Families through Connect Alabama 211
- □ Support the Integration of Services in Every County Through the Alabama County Extension Services



Executive & Legislative Considerations

- Encourage New Industry to Set a Veteran Employee Percentage of 12% or higher
- Create a Governor's Veterans Friendly Employer Recognition Award Program
- Establish a Veteran Promotion Point System for Disabled Veterans Employed by the State
- Offer In-State Tuition to all Student Veterans and Encourage Neighboring States to Offer the Same Education Benefit
- □ Promote and Encourage the Establishment of Student Veteran Centers on Alabama College and University Campuses
