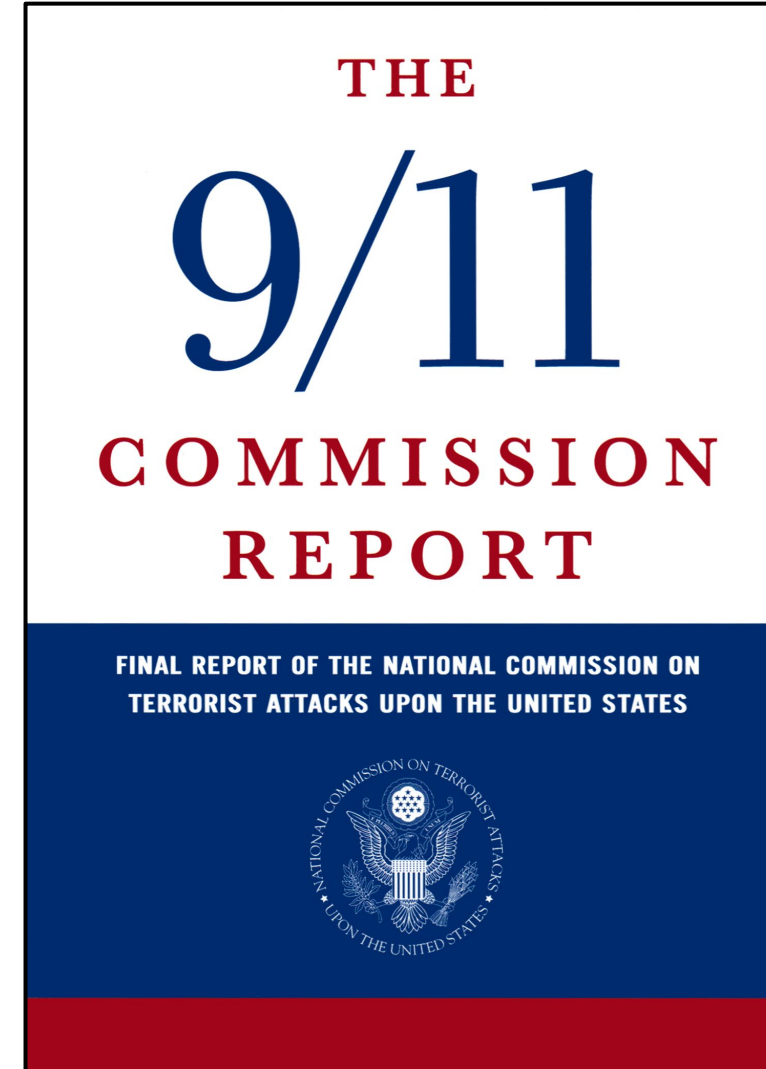

(U//LES) The Alabama Fusion Center (AFC) received information concerning threats made toward law enforcement and civilians by an individual in Tuscaloosa County, Alabama. Based on our analysis, the AFC assesses that the subject may pose a HIGH risk to law enforcement should they encounter James Kyser Jr.

History: Missing (dismissed), Harassment (dismissed), R. Endangerment (acquitted), Impersonating an Officer (awaiting trial)

(U//LES) Over the past few months, [REDACTED] has made multiple statements regarding his conviction over his 2014 arrest for impersonating an officer, as well as decreasing statements toward his employer, coworkers, and law enforcement according to complaints filed by the subject's coworkers. This included the threat to kill the police officers, judges, and lawyers involved in his ongoing trial for impersonating an officer, and threats to kill his supervisors and coworkers.

(U//LES) Based on [REDACTED] stated intent, his opportunity and probable capability to carry out his threats, and in conjunction with his history of confrontation and the possible inclusion of mental instability, the AFC assesses that Kyser poses a HIGH threat to law enforcement at this time. Any officer that encounters [REDACTED] is encouraged to exercise elevated caution when dealing with this individual.

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SITUATIONAL AWARENESS

Protests

There has been a rush on social media to organize protests related to the officer involved shootings in Baton Rouge, LA and Minnesota this past week. This includes Orlando and many other cities nationwide. These protests have no core organization and have been advertised on social media (Facebook, Twitter and Instagram), with great response from others on social media. There are three possible protests directly affecting Orlando between now and Monday evening.

March For Change:

- Saturday, July 9, 2016
- 1700 hrs
- Orange County Courthouse
- March to OPH (Orlando Police Headquarters) 100 S Hughey Ave.
- Unknown numbers, thought to be approximately 100 attendees, but could grow

Orlando Blackout March/O-Town March for Justice (3 separate social media organizers):

- Sunday, July 10, 2016
- Times conflict some but overlap; one says 1600-2000, other says 1930-2130
- March around Lake Eola Park
- Meeting at Robinson Street and Eola Drive, other meeting at 512 E. Washington St., Orlando
- Over 600 indicate they are going on social media sites

Unknown name protest at OPH:

- Monday, July 11, 2016
- 1900 hrs
- In front of OPH - 100 S Hughey Ave.
- Unknown numbers, very small social media following so far
- No flyers, just a few tweets

The protest with the potential for largest crowd is most likely on Sunday (07/10/16) at Lake Eola Park. No permits have been applied for these events. OPD and OCSO Intelligence will continue to monitor these events. These events are all currently planned within the jurisdiction of the Orlando Police Department.

(U//FOUO) Traditional Criminal Actors Shifting to Cyber Tactics to Facilitate and Conduct Criminal Activity

9 August 2016

(U//FOUO) Scope: This product seeks to identify and fill an existing intelligence and reporting gap regarding the emerging trend of traditional criminals using cyber tactics, techniques, and procedures (TTPs) to conduct illegal activity. This joint intelligence product by the New York State Intelligence Center (NYISIC), Multi-State Information Sharing and Analysis Center (MS-ISAC), and the New Jersey Cybersecurity and Communications Integration Cell (NJCCIC), covers examples of this type of activity, addresses known intelligence gaps, as well as provides a future outlook and recommendations on how to address this shift in TTPs for law enforcement officers, Fusion Centers, Chief Information Security Offices, and the U.S. Intelligence Community.

(U//FOUO) Executive Summary: The NYISIC, MS-ISAC, and NJCCIC assess with high confidence that a broad range of criminal actors and groups are increasingly relying upon technology-enabled and cyber tactics, techniques, and procedures (TTPs) to facilitate illicit activity. This emerging trend is highly likely to present significant challenges to law enforcement and homeland security personnel attempting to identify, investigate, disrupt, and prosecute criminal activity. We believe this transition is likely to accelerate in the next one to three years, as criminals are able to reduce the risk associated with conducting crime by utilizing technology-enabled and cyber TTPs, while increasing the return on their operations.






Despite this evolving trend, there is limited collection and correlation of these incidents, resulting in a number of intelligence gaps and overall lack of consistent, nationwide reporting of cyber-enabled crime. We strongly recommend law enforcement agencies, Fusion Centers, Chief Information Security Offices, and federal agencies monitor this trend and increase coordination and information sharing between crime and counterterrorism analysts and cyber analysts, as the cyber-enabled components of a crime are often secondary characteristics of a criminal case. The NYISIC, MS-ISAC, and NJCCIC would appreciate any information your department or agency can provide to assist us in monitoring and reporting on this trend.

(U//FOUO) FBI Arrests Virginia-Based Individual for Attempting to Provide Material Support and Resources to a Foreign Terrorist Organization

(U) Scope

(U//FOUO) This Joint Intelligence Bulletin (JIB) is intended to provide information on the 3 July 2016 arrest of Virginia-based Mohamed Bador Jalloh¹ for attempting to provide material support and resources to the self-proclaimed Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIL), a designated foreign terrorist organization (FTO). This JIB is provided by the FBI and DHS to support their respective activities and to assist federal, state, local, tribal, and territorial government counterterrorism and law enforcement officials and private sector security partners in deterring, preventing, or disrupting terrorist attacks against the United States. All events described in this JIB are taken from the criminal complaint filed in support of the arrest warrant. The charges contained in the criminal complaint are mere allegations, and, as in any criminal case, the defendant is presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

- SEAR 4: An event with limited national importance that is managed at the state and local level.
- SEAR 5: An event that may be nationally recognized but generally has local or state importance.

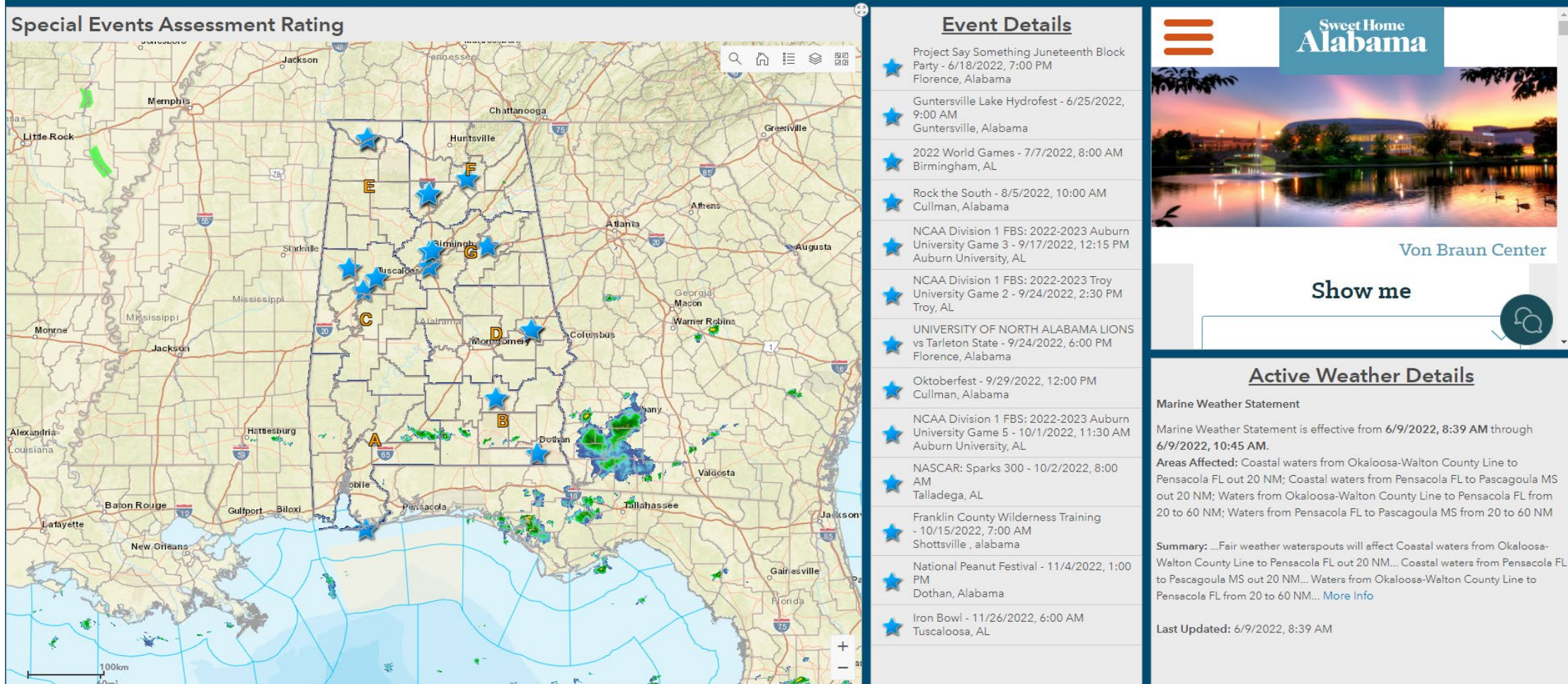

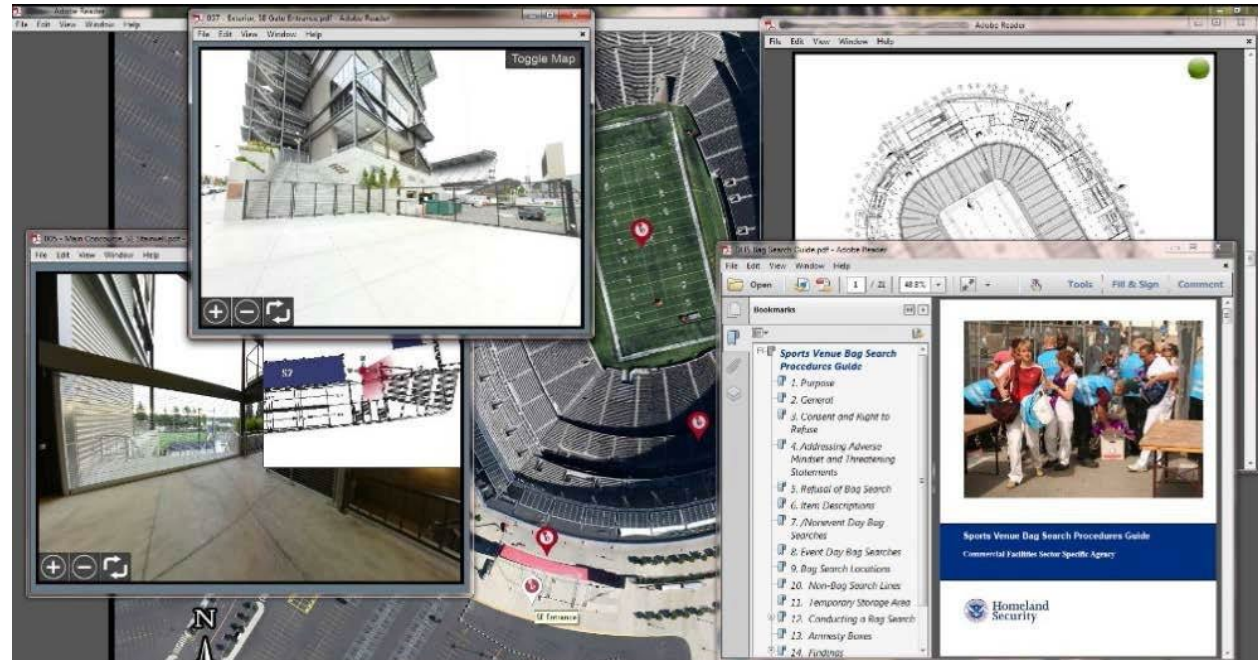
Protective Security Advisors (PSAs)

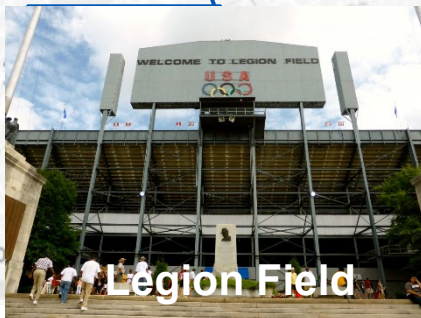

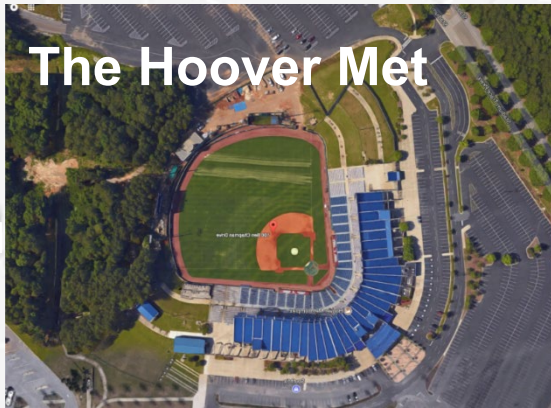
