Transforming County Government with ARPA Funds

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The American Rescue Plan Act provides relief to address the continued impact of COVID-19 on the economy, public health, state and local governments, individuals, and businesses.

- March 11, 2021: American Rescue Plan Act signed into law.
- May 10, 2021: Treasury releases the Interim Final Rule for ARPA expenditures.
- > August 31, 2021: Interim reports filed by all counties.
- January 6, 2022: Treasury releases the Final Rule, which allows counties to claim a standard allowance of up to \$10 million in revenue replacement.
- April 30, 2022: All counties file Project and Expenditure reports.
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Enumerated Uses of ARPA Funds

Replace lost public sector revenue.

- Respond to the far-reaching public health and negative economic impacts of the pandemic.
- > Provide **premium pay** for essential workers.
- > Invest in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure.

Premium Pay

- Providing premium pay for eligible county workers is an enumerated use specified by the Act.
- > Counties implementing premium pay programs: **37**.
- > Estimated total of **\$22,237,685** in planned expenditures.





Ventilation Upgrades

- Ventilation upgrades help to mitigate COVID-19 by providing enhanced air filtration to improve indoor air quality.
- > Estimated **40 projects** in planning or preparation.
- > Up to **30 more projects** under consideration.
- Most ventilation projects are focusing on courthouses and jails.
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> Water/Sewer Infrastructure

- Improvements to water and sewer infrastructure is an enumerated use in the Act.
- > Water/sewer projects in progress: **35**.
- > Current obligations for these projects: **\$19,284,926**.



Emergency Services

- Treasury's Final Rule allows up to \$10 million in revenue replacement funds to be used for government services.
- At least 5 counties are designating funds to rescue squads or volunteer fire departments to enhance the response time and emergency service coverage in underserved areas.
- Expected obligation: \$2,692,850
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Emergency Communications

- ARPA revenue replacement funds can be used to improve communications across the county.
- More than \$5 million has been allocated for the purchase or upgrade of emergency communications systems such as P-25 radios and E-911.





Support to Nonprofits

- Many nonprofits like food banks and animal shelters suffered losses in donations or staff due to the pandemic.
- > ARPA funds allow counties to help support these groups.
- Counties have made \$2 million in obligations to nonprofit entities including mental health facilities, community medical clinics, and indigent care systems.





Roads and Bridges

- Revenue replacement funds can be used to provide the counties' government services, including road and bridge repair and replacement.
- Almost \$25 million has been allocated to road and bridge projects.





Cybersecurity and Networking

- To be able to provide its essential services, counties need secure, up-to-date systems.
- > Cybersecurity and networking projects in the works: 8
- Estimated obligation: \$1,499,200.





Heavy Equipment

- Revenue replacement funds can be used to purchase equipment that allows the county to provide government services.
- Almost \$8.5 million allocated for heavy equipment purchases, including road equipment, emergency vehicles, and mowers.





Broadband

- Broadband infrastructure is an enumerated use provided by the Act.
- Plans for broadband expenditures are dependent upon passage of Amendment 2 in November's election.
- At least 6 counties have expressed interest in pursuing broadband projects.
